Three sister tribes unite for the Tri-Ute Games, an annual youth sporting event

Earlier in July, the Southern Ute, Ute Mountain Ute, and Ute Indian tribes got together for their annual friendly sports competition for youth. Youth athlete registration numbers soared as this year's Tri-Ute Games was the first time the event included all three sister tribes since the COVID-19 pandemic, and some registration requirements were opened to second tribal descendants.

At the Ignacio High School gymnasium, young athletes from the three Ute tribes played volleyball against each other at the annual Tri-Ute games. This year, the Southern Ute Tribe is hosting its sister tribes, the Ute Mountain Ute and Ute Indian tribes, in Ignacio.

given to Southern Ute tribal members. All spaces are uncovered, measuring approx. 12'x10' with a limited number of booths with access to power. If power is required, vendors are encouraged to sign up for the entire season by Aug. 1, at 10 p.m. to guarantee their spot and receive a 10% discount. Vendors may sign up for individual dates and pay incrementally as well. The deadline to sign up for individual markets will be 9 a.m. on the Tuesday prior to the next market.

The Píinu Núuchi Farmers Market and Outdoor Biz Lab is a unique opportunity for entrepreneurs living on the Southern Ute Indian Reservation and the surrounding community to sell their products and enhance their business. Ingredients:

For the salad you will need:

- 4 ripe peaches, sliced (about 8 slices ea.)
- · 1 cup fresh blueberries
- 4 mini cucumbers, sliced 1/4" coins
- Small handful of fresh basil, sliced thin
- 6oz. feta. crumbled

For the dressing you will need:

- 2/3 cup olive oil
- 1/3 cup balsamic rose vinegar (can use white wine vinegar)
- 2 teaspoons lemon zest, grated finely
- 1 tsp Diion mustard
- · 2 shallots, finely chopped
- · Salt to taste

- 1. Place peaches, blueberries, and cucumbers in a large bowl.
- 2. In a medium bowl, mix all dressing ingredients together, whisk vigorously.




Summer Tutoring


Good information in the digital age

In the late 90s, as the promise of the world wide web (isn't it funny that the abbreviation has more syllables than the words) had yet to reach most U.S. households, the media was saturated with promises of an internet paradise. These reports and articles included glowing visions of how access to information through our computers would broaden communication making our lives more efficient, rewarding, and effortless. Events have not quite turned out as envisioned.

Many saw the future of the internet as a place for individuals to make thoughtful exchanges of information as found in many of the early web logs (blogs). Instead, social media sites like Facebook and TikTok exchanged personal freedom for ease of access and presented us with superficial messages while providing or selling personal information to the highest bidder. This ease of access has also allowed poorly researched or purposely misleading information onto a platform for dissemination. It is important to note that most social networking sites work on algorithms that favor popularity and not accuracy.

These rose-colored glass predictions did not foresee how this public exchange of information would lead to an increase in the number of people who find themselves pulled into believing unconfirmed and erroneous ideas. Today the flat earth conspiracy is larger than at any time in the past, largely due to the ease of sharing informa-



The Four Corners Food Coalition distributes produce and shares food knowledge with Native families

An Indigenous-led food coalition in the Four Corners is giving locally grown produce to Native families every week. The grant-funded program is part of an effort to address health inequity in the community.

In a warehouse in Cortez, Colo., Karlos Baca, a Southern Ute and Dine' chef and food organizer, demonstrated how to fry green tomatoes in commeal grown on the nearby Ute Mountain Ute reservation.

"All local, everything here is local produce," Baca said to a participant.

Twenty Indigenous families from the Four Corners area stopped in to watch Baca demonstrate how to cook, eat his fried tomatoes, and pick up packages of produce from local farmers.

"Every family gets to leave with the bag. Hopefully, everyone shows up, so 20 bags will be leaving, and everybody gets to take this knowledge home," Baca said.

that I dub it "the big day" because there are shifts in climate, harvest, forage, temperature, and attitude that all come about in anticipation of this day.

It has been no secret that in the past I have sometimes referred to the secrecy of farmers/ranchers in how things are done. These are the types of things that create a competitive advantage compared to other farmers/ranchers. Still, I have seen that yet again, July 1st seems to be the official day of hay cutting season for first cut. All up and down County Road 516 and 172, grasses have been growing and seeding up to that day.

This year, we saw that there was actually a large series of back-to-back storms that occurred the entire week of July 1st. This knocked back many of the hay bines and swathers to take some days off. When it looked like the rain passed after a few days, many farmers cut their fields only to find a second wave of storms moving in during the matures. following week. Needless been the go to day yet again for the fourth straight year that I have been watching when farmers cut.

SEE THE FOREST FOR THE TREES

Each year, with each harvest, on a daily basis, I learn so much more about this farming thing. When I first noticed that everyone seemed to be cutting on July 1st of every year, I decided to cut my fields sooner. The reason being, is that I saw my selection of forage being a grass that seeded out early. Once the grass CHANGING OF THE seeds out, the growth significantly slows down. Then comes maturity, which is a time when I noticed that most farmers have somemy grasses seemed to get thicker stalks, the tops of the grasses began to brown (bronze), and the seeds would begin to drop. All of this occurred about two weeks prior to July 1st, so for me, it made sense to cut a little earlier to take advantage of the growth stages in which the stalks were softer and more palatable.

My horse customers like the conditions of my soft selection of grasses and I done. know that letting the grass mature and sit another week or two would add to the tonnage and quantity of the bales, but I'm more interested in the quality. This said, I do understand why people do wait until July 1st. Particularly, when a person has alfalfa which come in right repellants.





NOTICE: HAY FOR SALE/GARDEN VEGETABLES Tribal Members ONLY

The Tribe's Agriculture Division has hay and garden vegetables available for Tribal members. The hay was grown by the Agriculture Division at the Tribe's Pivot Demonstration Project. The hay is approximately 40% alfalfa mixed with grass. Small bales (65 lbs.) and large bales (1,000 lbs.).

Tribal members will be limited to no more than 160 small square bales OR 8 large square bales. The price per bale includes hauling and stacking within a 15-mile radius of Ignacio. Otherwise, tribal members will need to pick up.

Second cutting will be completed within the next week. Prices for second cutting will be set after harvest is completed so hay quality can be known. This hay is available to Tribal members only and on first come first served basis.

The Tribal Demonstration Garden is growing quickly. Agriculture Division staff have planted a variety of vegetables and some vegetables are available now. Stop by the Agriculture Division Office to share in the harvest. If you would like to visit the garden contact the office and a garden tour will be scheduled.


Strong Elk recognized as 'Ambassador for Peace'

Why is it important to have Indigenous foster homes?

It is important to have foster homes licensed within the boundaries of the Southern Ute Indian Reservation so that children are not placed away from their families/relatives, their schools, and their communities if they do enter the foster care system.

The Indian Child Welfare Act (ICWA) was established in 1978

>It is a Federal Law that requires Indigenous children be placed with their own relatives first if they enter foster care, or with another Indigenous family.

>It also requires the States to notify the child's Tribe of origin if the State takes an Indigenous child into custody.

>It is also intended to prevent Indigenous children from being removed from their homes and adopted by non-Indigenous families.





Natural ignition spurs innovative fire management in San Juan National Forest

On May 14, a lightning strike sparked the Spruce Creek Fire 11 miles Northeast of Dolores, Colo. on Haycamp Mesa in the San Juan National Forest. This fire presented an uncommon opportunity for the Dolores Ranger District to employ indirect tactics for forest restoration and enhance community safety.

The Spruce Creek fire ignited within a network of forest system roads that fire managers identified as ideal containment lines. Thanks to favorable weather and fuel conditions, firefighters were able to burn out the interior of the road system, guiding the fire to these lines rather than building new ones at the fire's edge.

The 5.699-acre fire burned with low-to-moderate intensity in heavy timber, Gambel oak and deep duff (a dense layer of partially decomposed pine needles). Removing this highly flammable vegetation is a step toward protecting local communities and infrastructure from the risk of future high-intensity wildfires. Additionally, the restorative nature of wildfire in this fire-adapted ecosystem is a secondary benefit.

"We [used] this natural ignition to maximize the positive effects from fire and minimize the negative effects of catastrophic fire," said Nick Mustoe, Fire often also offers numer-District Ranger for the Dolores Ranger District. 




